Dear Friends,

This Newsletter gets delivered to you in May, but is printed a couple of weeks before, which means that all contributions have to be written before that. So, I am writing this just after Easter. We returned from a holiday in Spain a couple of days ago so my head is still full of the amazing places we saw, the delicious food we ate, and the sights and sounds of the language and signs that we saw and heard as we travelled on the trains, in restaurants, and the different conversations that we had throughout the week. Despite some weeks of regular practice on Duolingo beforehand, my Spanish could not exactly be described as fluent – but I really enjoyed reading menus and street signs and anything else that I saw on the way. One of the things I noticed was the instruction "esperar", which anyone who has learned a Romance language will know means both "wait" AND "hope".

In English we use completely different words for these two things but of course we can see that "waiting" and "hoping" are related, once we stop to think about it, because why would we bother waiting for something if we didn't have hope that it was actually going to happen? We have been waiting and hoping for Spring, waiting and hoping for warmer, drier weather and longer, lighter days all through the winter. All through the forty days of Lent, and especially in the three days from Good Friday until the Sunday morning, the Church waited for Easter, and the good news of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. And we waited, not in despair but in hope and expectation.


What are the things that you hope for? Is there some change, some shift in your own circumstances, or in someone else's life that you are waiting for, that you hope will happen? Waiting and hoping is all that gets us through bad patches, so often. Jesus talked to his friends about the importance of waiting in hope and expectation for God to act: "Look for the Kingdom of God which is closer than your own hand", but the Bible also makes it clear that it is also up to us to take action in hope that God is here and is involved with our lives. We have to jump in and help be the change that we want to see (that is one way of loving our neighbour as we love ourselves) to make the world a kinder, better place. But we don't do that work by ourselves, instead we can reach out and help each other in the knowledge and in the hope that God IS here, and is present among us and continues to call us into a knowledge of God's love for each of us, day after day, week after week, throughout all the seasons of our years.

Important Clarification regarding Planning Applications

Following comments from a number of villagers, there appears to be some confusion regarding the two proposed planning applications on Evesham Road.

Some villagers have confused the recent application for 66 houses on Evesham Road, thinking it is a reduced number of dwellings relating to the travellers site on Evesham Road (known as Wayside Caravan Site). THIS IS NOT THE CASE.

There are two live planning applications on Evesham Road.

1. W/22/02682/OUT. This is the planning application for Wayside Caravan Site for up to 100 dwellings on the current brown-field site used as a travellers site.

2. W/24/00632/FUL. This is a planning application on Evesham Road opposite Mill Lane for 66 dwellings on a current green-field site.

We trust this clarifies any confusion regarding these two separate planning applications.

SAVE THE KINGS ARMS

Dear Friends of the Kings Arms,

I am delighted to report that we are beginning to make progress. After the disappointment of narrowly failing to be awarded the £300,000 grant in Round 3 of

the Community Ownership Fund process, Round 4 was opened immediately. Time is now very short for the Government to meet their target of providing £150million to organisations trying to protect essential assets by taking these into community ownership, (only £71million has been allocated in the first 3 Rounds). This 4th Round of funding was only open for 2 weeks! We were able to rewrite and improve our application and submit before the deadline of 10th April. With ongoing strong support from our MP, Nigel Huddlestone we are cautiously optimistic this time around.

In the meantime, we were delighted to learn that we have been successful in receiving a grant from the Architectural Fund for £6,000 which will pay for the independent accreditation of our Community Share Offer prospectus, the detailed Building Condition Surveys and reports we will need to undertake and most of our marketing costs for the launch of the Share Offer below. Oor other excellent news is that our Community Share Offer, with its supporting business plan, has now been assessed by an independent accreditor provided by the Plunkett Foundation and has been awarded the Cooperatives UK Standard Quality Mark. This means that you can read this document with confidence. The Community Shares Standard Mark is awarded by the Community Shares Unit to Share Offers that meet national standards of good practice. These standards ensure that:

- the offer document and application form are easy to understand;
- you are provided with all the facts you need to make an informed decision;
- the facts are supported by the annual accounts and/or business plan for the society.

You can find full versions of the Share Offer and Business Plan on our website <u>www.cleevepriorcommunitypub.co.uk</u>.

The Share Offer will open online on 27th April and will close on 30th June 2024. Our optimum target is at least £200,000 towards the total needed to buy, refurbish and open the Kings Arms under our ownership.

You are invited to the **SAVE THE KINGS ARMS Community Share Offer Launch Presentation** on **Saturday 11th May at 2.00pm** in the Memorial Hall. Tea/coffee and biscuits will be provided. A short presentation followed by a Q & A session will provide information on our progress to-date, our next steps and how to buy shares.

We are printing launch leaflets and flyers to publicise this important launch. **We will need volunteers** to distribute these pamphlets within Cleeve Prior and surrounding towns and villages. Our target for the Share Offer is **£200,000**. We received initial non-binding pledges to the value of £120,000 from only 95 respondents after our Open Day on 10th February so, while there is a gap to be made up, we are confident that this target is achievable. The communities of Norton Lindsey, Loxley, Elmley Castle and Little Malvern raised sums ranging from £232,000 to £400,000 in their campaigns to save their beloved local pubs so there is no reason why we should not be successful. Remember, if we do not buy the pub your investment will be returned to you.

And, while this is not the main reason why anyone should invest in this project to save the Kings Arms as a thriving hub of the village, loss of a village pub has been estimated by Charlie Comber, Partner of Hayman Joyce, Broadway to potentially affect property values by as much as 10%.

CONSERVATION, PRESERVATION, EDUCATION



On a very wet and dismal day, ten intrepid members of Cleeve Prior NWR made their way to Warwick for a visit to Hill Close Trust Gardens. We were given a fascinating insight into the origins and development of these historic "Detached Gardens". Such gardens were popular amongst the trades people of places like Warwick where the owners of business usually lived above their premises and had little or no access to gardens or green spaces. They bought plots of land just on the outskirts of the town where they created gardens and cultivated flowers, fruit and vegetables.

The Trust has extensive records of who owned the various plots and this provides an insight to the trades and shops operating in Warick in the late 1800's. The gardens gradually fell into dereliction as the owners died, moved away and the Council bought up all the plots they could with a view to redevelopment. They were eventually lost under a mass of brambles and undergrowth.

They were under the threat of the bulldozers when a local group decided to try to save them. They "unearthed" one of the brick "Summer Houses" and had it declared a listed building so the site was saved from destruction and now an army of volunteers together with some professional gardeners have stripped back the years of neglect and returned the various plots to their original splendour.

One of the outstanding features of the site are the "summer houses" – brick buildings which served as a base for the families when they spent their days tending the plots. Some have fireplaces and looked very snug. There are also some pig styes – a remnant of the times when a pork butcher owned that plot.

As part of our guided tour, we were provided with tea and very excellent cakes, which were very welcome after our rainy tour round the gardens. Hill Trust Gardens are a hidden gem and definitely worth a visit. All of us are planning a return visit, hopefully without the rain!

Did you know?

Did you know that, after the evacuation of Dunkirk in June 1940, Cleeve Prior paid host to a unit of six RAF meteorologists and their driver attached the Royal Artillery? Their function was to provide secret weather information for the location of German guns and for the optimum efficiency of our own artillery.

There is an article in the Chroniclers (found on the village website) where they describe how they were lifted off the mole at Dunkirk, and from Margate were transported to the railway halt at Cleeve Prior. This is described as "a wooden platform about 100yds long with a building of wood in the middle, (presumably the booking office). In the usual railway lettering was the village name Cleeve Prior Halt on top of the wooden building"

Having then been put up in the village hall, eaten and slept for 11 to 12 hours, they started to explore the village and soon discovered the Kings Arms. They recount: "At the entrance there was a double gate where they saw a pretty, well-maintained garden. As we stood by the gate a youngish woman approached, and having discovered who and what we were she invited us into the garden, seating us in a pleasant summer house while she went in search of her father, the licensee. In a short time, this gentleman appeared with an enormous enamel jug of beer and four pint pots. Having served in France in WW1 he wanted to learn all about our activities, and a pleasant couple of hours were spent with more beer until opening time at 6.00pm. We let the licensee know that what little money we had would almost certainly be French. He seated us in a corner of the bar where the entrance is today. At about 8.30 he told us that his wife had prepared a special meal for us, roast duck, peas, new potatoes, with stewed gooseberries to follow.

The army in its wisdom had declared a curfew in to billets at 9.30 pm and we were somewhat late. The next day we were all charged with being absent. This was ridiculous as the Army had no jurisdiction over RAF personnel. However, after a lot of argument and discussion, each one of us was addressed by the Colonel. I was first. After listening to my explanation, particularly the wonderful meal, he dismissed the charge and said, we had done better than he had".

The lads were moved to another location soon after. Interesting to note, they saw the sign showing Cleeve Prior at the railway station which I guess was actually Salford Prior station – I wonder if there ever was a sign showing the village?
