The Benefice of the East Vale and Avon Villages

Q: What does the Vicar actually DO with her time?

Recently I had some business cards printed. The logo in the middle of the card shows an arch of green and white leaves, with something like a stylised person standing underneath. I chose it because it reminded me of our Benefice logo which shows a tree on the banks of a river, which could represent the Vale's heritage of orchards by the banks of the River Avon, but also of the verse in the Bible describing "...a river whose streams make glad the city of God." The logo on my cards reminds me of all of this, and there is something about the way that the human figure is standing with their arms outstretched up towards the leaves reminds me of a juggler, which is pretty appropriate since I seem to spend a lot of my time juggling very different concerns and roles.

These vary hugely from week to week and from season to season, though there are thankfully some things that form a bedrock, running steadily, forming the rhythm of my days. With January behind us, Christmas decorations all packed away, our Epiphany celebrations have finished (look out for "2025 + C M B +" chalked on or near your church doorway, reminding us of the journey of the Wise Men to see the Holy Family). Instead, I am preparing to meet all our wedding couples on the Saturday of Valentine's weekend, with a team of helpers to give them some information about the legal processes, together with wedding bells, flowers, music systems etc. – all the different things that can go into a wedding in one of our churches to make it a memorable day for them.

Right on that day's heels will come Ash Wednesday, and the start of Lent which gives us the chance to do a sort of mental clear-out, ask ourselves some hard questions about our lives, and try to give some honest answers. to ourselves, and to God, about what really matters. It can be life changing! In amongst all the drama and extra services and events in Lent, Holy Week and Easter, I will also be talking with our five sets of church wardens and treasurers preparing for our annual parish meetings which take place just after Easter. Mixed in with all of this, there are meetings with each wedding couple to help them prepare

for their big day, with baptism families for their baptism services on Sundays (most take place in the afternoon, though some christenings happen as part of our regular Sunday services at our different churches.) Then there are regular Sunday services and other events to prepare for as well, plus meetings with our Benefice worship team members.

I also meet regularly with each of our three school principals when we plan dates when I can come in to take assemblies, or be in school to support students and staff for key events. I am often asked to come and talk to a class, which could be anything from "What is a font?" to "Tell us about why you wear those funny clothes on Sunday."

Given that I look after five congregations and six church buildings, serve as a school governor and on three trust boards, a lot of work has to be done by phone, or messaging and emails, across our whole Benefice and with staff at the Diocesan office in Worcester. I work with our worship team, our dedicated church wardens and treasurers to make sure that our churches can stay open and services can take place as planned. But mixed in with all the admin, all the joys and worries, all the emails and phone calls, whether I am out dog-walking or calling in to see someone, all the 101 plates that I juggle as your minister, all this is underpinned by a steady rhythm of prayer, of listening and responding as best as I can to the heart-beat of God's love for all of us here in this place. God bless you in all that you are juggling with in your life.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS February 2025

Vacant positions

We are pleased to welcome Mr. Ian Kelly as a new member of the Parish Council. He has now participated in The December 2024 and January 2025 meetings.

We still have two unfilled Councillor positions so, if you have an interest and want more information, please use the email address shown below. We have also been conducting interviews with applicants for the position of Clerk to the Parish Council. In the meantime, individual Councillors are covering the immediate Clerk responsibilities.

Handrail to steps at Manor Court

A custom-made handrail to the steps leading to the Church passage near Manor Court has now been installed. Thanks are due to our County Councillor, Mr Alistair Adams for pushing this through.

Evesham Road negotiations

Though negotiations around the housing planning application for the site in Evesham Road have moved at a snail's pace, we have seen some movement recently. The Parish Council is in active contact with the developer over their acquisition of a small part of and restitution of the Council owned CPO land. Also there appears to be movement on the developer's final acquisition of the two outstanding plots on the site.

Parish Finances

An important part of the Parish Council year-end activity is to plan and submit our budgets to Wychavon District Council. Given our problems with retention of a Clerk, we have had to reluctantly revise upward our provision for Clerk salary and other factors. This incurs a 9.1% increase in the Parish precept. Our proposal is currently with WDC for consideration.

SAVE THE KINGS ARMS

Dear Friends of the Kings Arms, Goodness me, what a lot has happened since the last edition of the Parish Newsletter! Most of you will now be aware that on 23 December we were

informed that our application for grant funding from the Community Ownership Fund had been successful, subject to final validation at an Initial Project Meeting with the COF grant awards team. The results were published on the Government website. The COF scheme has now been officially closed. This now means that we will NOT, at this time, be pursuing further the Public Works Loan discussed in previous correspondence.

Members of the Community Benefit Society Management Team, supported by our advisor from Plunkett Foundation, took part in an online Initial Project Meeting with the Grant Lead Manager and the Commercial Lead on Wednesday 22 January. This meeting was to validate the viability and deliverability of the project, considering the amount of time that has elapsed since our application was received. I am happy to report that this meeting was very positive in tone and we are now awaiting final confirmation which should be received within 10 days. Drafting of the final Grant Award Agreement will take a further two to four weeks.

This positive news has allowed us to submit a formal offer to purchase the freehold of the Kings Arms. This offer has now been accepted subject to surveys and legal searches! The terms of sale are that we would purchase the freehold with vacant possession.

Most of the above was communicated by email to Shareholder members of the CBS and at a very well attended public meeting held in the Memorial Hall on 11 January. An electronic satisfaction survey has also been sent to Shareholder members providing them with an opportunity to voice opinions and guide decisions on the future operation of the pub as a community hub.

As a result of all this excellent news, support for the Community Share Offer has significantly increased and the amount of money raised is now almost £140,000. If you have not yet invested, especially if you have not yet fulfilled earlier pledges, please consider doing so as soon as possible. We need to reach our target of £175,000 to be able to execute our plans fully for refurbishment and improvement of the pub while meeting the requirements of match funding for COF. Application forms for shares are available on our website www.cleevepriorcommunitypub.co.uk or as hard copies in the pub, or from any member of the Management team.

One question which came up this month is "Why do we hang toast in the tree at our Wassail?" What happens?

Our Wassail Queen, suitably attired, pours cider from the Wassail Cup onto the roots of the tree before our volunteers sing the wassailing song and hang toast from the branches to encourage all the good spirits to watch over the apples trees and to provide a bountiful crop come harvest time. By the way this is the origin of the word "toasting" at celebrations! This year our very own Rev Mary gave the blessing and then we all retired for an excellent supper at Field Barn.

Our volunteers work hard all the year round to maintain the orchards, gather in the fruit and turn it into cider or apple juice so it is good to celebrate the start of the season when the trees are dormant and the pruning cycle is about to start.

This time of year is about clearing, pruning, maintenance and tree planting. We have just taken delivery of 30 woodland trees — well whips, for Sanctuary Wood which will be planted up, thanks to the Trees Call to Action project. They also provided a training day on hedge laying for two of our Volunteers in January. Good News - we have been successful in a grant application for a defibrillator to be sited at Field Barn. Anyone interested in taking part in the training, especially our near neighbours, please let me know.

The carpet of primroses are coming out in Top Wood so do have a wander up and have a look in the next week or so. Please remember to keep dogs on leads in Sanctuary Wood and the Sanctuary and always to pick up after your dog in **all** areas.

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
