The Benefice of the East Vale and Avon Villages

Dear Friends,

Over the last few months, we have welcomed a Ukrainian family to come and share our home. The war in Ukraine has forced Alla and two of her children from their home in Irpin, first to Poland and then two years later to us here in Badsey village, where they have had to make huge adjustments, getting used to rural English life, learning yet another language, tasting different foods ("What is this cauliflower cheese?"), making new friends in school -and all whilst mourning the loss of their lovely home and garden and the continued relentless advance of the Russians into Ukraine. One of the ways in which Alla, the mum, has coped with creating this new (hopefully temporary) life in England, is through something she knows and loves deeply – gardening and growing things – and she takes special satisfaction in rescuing vegetable seeds or roots left over from preparing our meals, putting them into water or soil where I would have thrown them onto the compost heap. It is as if she is so aware of the fragility of life, the way that life - any life - is precarious and uncertain, and can be snuffed out and destroyed before it has barely begun – and wants to do whatever she can to save it, give it new life and hope. Pumpkin seeds, tomato seeds, the ends of celery, squash seeds, the top cut from a pineapple – all have been carefully set aside, given pots of earth or water, and a chance to thrive.

One thing especially she loves to grow: avocado stones. Our kitchen windowsill is now filled with little yoghurt pots from the children, each with an avocado stone set in some water. At first, I regarded this as a complete waste of time (and precious window sill space). For weeks the stones just SAT there, apparently unresponsive at best, or turning black. I thought about throwing some of them out when Alla wasn't looking - but she loves them all, and kept them so carefully, so I didn't. And then, long after I had given up on them and was about to suggest they went on the compost heap, first one and then another sent up a slender shoot - yellow and then sprouting little leaves. It's alive!

I thought about the way I had felt- as so many of us did – in those weeks of gloom in February; thick cloud with absolutely no sun visible for day after day. Cold winds, relentless grey overhead, and in my head and heart, with no obvious feeling of Spring. Would it ever end? But it did – and the clouds finally parted, as the sun shone, and I noticed all the primroses flowering in the grass -and the faint mist of green in the hawthorn hedges and on our neighbour's beautiful weeping willow tree.

Just when we feel like giving up, we are given a sign, something that makes us realise that there is hope -that change IS possible, and life can begin again.

Just when Jesus' friends had thought that he was gone forever, that they would never see their beloved teacher and friend ever again, he appeared among them, to bless them and encourage them, filling them with wild joy and excitement and hope for the future. So now, every Easter, the church celebrates this message and proclaims it for all who need to hear it and see it: the grave is empty, because Love is stronger than death. May the life and peace of the risen Lord be always with you.

God bless you this Easter.

Friends of St.Andrew's

St Andrew's is one church in the Benefice of six churches (five holding regular services) with Jo Fielding as Priest in Charge). However, Cleeve Prior has never been a large community and, as numbers on the electoral roll have fallen, so too has the income received, whilst the costs of maintaining this ancient and beautiful building keep increasing.

The building is not owned by "The Church of England", but is a community asset. The church does not have property deeds as such; most churches do not, as they date to times long before such things were thought of. The legal position is that the ownership of a church - including St Andrew's, Cleeve Prior, is generally vested in the incumbent and held on trust by the PCC for the parishioners, while the contents are the distinct responsibility of the churchwardens who hold them on trust for the parishioners.

To enable the church to remain open – whether daily for visitors or for services and other events to continue to take place, we need to meet significant costs.

In order to safeguard the future of St Andrew's for the next generation, we wish to start a **Friends of St Andrew's**_community group. This would enable us to get information out quickly and easily to the local community about events that we are holding or special services. It would also be a great way for people to talk together and plan events that would enable some much-needed fund-raising to take place or mobilise volunteers to help run events or give a hand with e.g. the churchyard.

More immediately we need to start a fund-raising campaign that will enable us to meet the cost of our much-needed new speaker and loop system. If you would be interested in sponsoring a PA Speaker or part-sponsoring one (£200 each), please contact me as soon as possible, or our Treasurer, Mrs Annette Carless.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS April 2025

We have been carrying vacancies for Councillors for some time and we are pleased to say that we are nearly up to strength now that Mr. Doug Carr has re-joined the Council. He brings much knowledge and experience. We still have one Cllr. Vacancy so if you are interested, please contact the clerk email which is shown below.

The larger concern relates to our vacancy for a Clerk. This is a formally employed position and is essential for the proper running of the legal aspects of the Council. After an intensive process to recruit for this position we had offered the job to an excellent candidate who, due to family issues, has had to decline at a late stage. We continue to search for a suitable recruit so if you are aware of anyone who might be interested, please let us know. In the interim the Councillors are sharing the load and contributing considerable extra effort to keep the formal activities in order.

Evesham Road development.

Planning application Code: W/22/02682/OUT

We are still having difficulties in maintaining formal contact with the developer Malvern Homes. However, the information we glean from other sources suggests that negotiations for Malvern to secure the property rights are reaching a positive conclusion and we hope to have a clear update for the

next Newsletter. The Parish Council are positioned to proceed when the time arrives with grants arranged for clearance of the CPO land and formally registered S106 signatories.

Prior House development.

Planning application Code: W/24/00632/FUL

Councillors attended and spoke at the Planning Hearing on 27th February_.We thought that the Committee gave all the objections a fair hearing but after all the pros and cons were balanced, the Committee gave approval to the application. This approval is subject to a number of conditions being met before any work proceeds, not least of these is the need for a solution to the issue of surface water disposal. We await the outcome. We offer thanks to our District Councillor, Hannah Robson who has worked tirelessly on this application on our behalf.

The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled for Monday 7 April at 7.30pm at The Memorial Hall where, as usual, a busy agenda will be addressed.

SAVE THE KINGS ARMS

Dear Friends of the Kings Arms

At a Public Meeting on Tuesday 11 March the Community Benefits Society (CBS) informed attendees that despite its offer to purchase the Kings Arms being accepted on

9 January, with solicitors instructed, and all relevant surveys complete, a higher offer had been submitted by a third party and that offer had been accepted.

At the meeting Steve Thomas, the current tenant announced that he had submitted the higher offer and was the new Purchaser. A lengthy discussion followed, which continued after Mr Thomas left the meeting. It was later suggested by a member of the local community that perhaps someone other than a member of the CBS Steering Group should be invited to mediate between the parties to explore the possibility of a compromise solution. This was agreed.

After further discussion, it was generally agreed within the room that a solution should be explored whereby Mr Smart-Thomas would agree to withdraw from the purchase in return for a long-term lease, on favourable terms, with a high level of autonomy. It should be noted again that Mr Thomas had by now left the meeting and was not party to discussions around mediation.

The CBS Steering Group put together a detailed written proposal which would secure and safeguard the freehold for the community, using the once in a lifetime opportunity offered by our recent confirmed grant awards and share sales while, at the same time, address the needs of the sitting tenant to provide a level of security for his business and family. The main pillars of the proposal were: a 10 year lease, the CBS being responsible for all required immediate refurbishment costs and future upkeep of the fabric of the building, 6 months rent free to cover the transition period while refurbishment works were completed followed by a further 6 months at a rent of only £1,000 per month. Similarly, Years 2 and 3 at rents of £15,000 and £18,000 (significantly below the independently assessed market rent of £35,000 per annum) giving the business time to develop and flourish.

Unfortunately, despite several attempts by both the mediator and members of the Steering Group, this written proposal was unable to be delivered as Mr Thomas refused to enter into any meaningful discussions. Finally, the Steering Group have written to both the selling agents and the owner of the property stating that we are ready to step in with funds available should the proposed sale to Mr Thomas not materialise.

The DEFIBRILLATOR is now in place at the entrance to Field Barn. Training sessions are planned for our volunteers and immediate neighbours to Field Barn during April.

ORCHARD BOUNDARIES - We have been cutting back the overgrown hedgerows to our orchards. Sometimes, it can seem quite alarming to see multiple piles of branches on the ground. This work is essential and is not only good for the orchard but is also good for the hedges by opening them up and letting light in. There are legal and environmental restrictions on this type of work and to comply with these, we do not cut hedges beyond the end of February. Our volunteers are always mindful of the natural world and in particular of any impact on wildlife. Please think about birdlife in your own garden. It is prime time for nesting and populations of small garden birds are under threat according to the RSPB.

To minimise emissions from fires, the Trust has recently purchased a WOOD CHIPPER which we have been putting to good use. We spread the resulting chippings around our fruit trees to deter weed growth.

PRUNING of Fruit Trees is underway in Perry Pear Orchard and will resume in other areas now that the hedging work has stopped.

SCHOOL VISITS - we were pleased to welcome children from Cleeve Prior School where the focus was on plants and plant life cycles. Thanks to those who donated snowdrops which the children planted at the top of Sanctuary Wood during their visit.

EVESHAM RAMBLERS returned for their annual meeting at Field Barn during the month enjoying the beautiful surroundings and delicious cakes baked by our volunteers. This helps to raise much needed funds for equipment and maintenance.

Cleeve Prior NWR March Meeting

A night at the movies is always a tantalizing prospect but when that night is in the village and in the comfort of one of

our members' homes, it is even more appealing, especially with excellent drinks and nibbles generously provided by our host Sue.

We are fortunate in Cleeve Prior to have our own cinematographic expert in the shape of Karen and she chose *The Outrun* for our Film Night, starring Saoirse Ronan. The title refers to an outlying coastal piece of farmland on Orkney where the grass stays short due to the continual Atlantic Spray. It is adapted from Amy Liptrot's memoir and is set in London and Orkney.

The contrasts between Rona's (the main character) life in London and back home on Orkney were striking and became very much part of the narrative. Rona was battling with alcoholism and depression. Family relationships and her early childhood experiences with a bi-polar father whom she obviously loved, played a major part in her finding solace in drinking to excess. We had religion, Orcadian rituals, Stone Circles, Myths of the Silkie people, ecology – she became involved in trying to preserve and restore the habitat of the endangered Corn Crake – and much more.

The cinematography treated the two locations as characters with the wild and dangerous aspects of both places being woven together in the many flashbacks of Rona's life.

The scenes set in Orkney and the tiny remote Island of Papa Westray were stunning and the sense of isolation palpable, especially when Rona was unable to leave Papa for Christmas as the small island plane couldn't land. Did it end happily ever after – possibly, but I won't give any spoilers but it is a film we – most of us – very much enjoyed and it is available on Netflix.

Vehicle Crime

We can often see car thieves and car key burglars using the cover of night to carry out their crimes, but a few small steps can help stop them in their tracks. By taking a few crime prevention measures motorists can help prevent themselves from being a victim of crime.

West Mercia Police is committed to tackling vehicle crime and has the following advice to protect your cars, motorbikes and vans from being stolen: **Do you have a security light/doorbell camera**?

- Having a security light gives you an extra layer of protection. Security lights give the impression someone is in and removes the element of darkness.
- Installing a doorbell camera or security camera on your driveway can help to deter criminals too and many products are much less expensive than you may think.

Lock your windows

• Make sure your windows are securely locked. As with your doors, check that your window locks are of a good standard to prevent car key burglars. **Get a steering wheel disc lock**

• Steering wheel disc locks are a good deterrent to would-be thieves as they delay the amount of time it takes to steal a vehicle.

If possible, secure your vehicle out of sight in a garage

• If you have a garage, parking your vehicle out of sight in there with a securely locked door keeps it out of sight of criminals and much harder to steal.

Put your keys in a 'Faraday' pouch

• Place your keyless entry fobs in a "Faraday pouch" to prevent relay theft where thieves boost the signal from the car to the key fob to gain access.

Remove all valuables from your vehicle

• Make sure there is nothing of value left in your car.

Install a tracker to your vehicle

•Putting a GPS tracker on your car will enable its location to be tracked by police. Your insurance company can advise you on suitable products.

Fit a foldable bollard to your driveway

• This may be a more expensive option, but it is a wise investment to prevent vehicles being driven off, particularly if you have a high value one on your driveway.

Remember thieves can often look to target owners of high value and/or highperformance vehicles, any crime prevention measures taken can help reduce the chances of being targeted.
