Dear Friends,

Through June and July, I get to take part in one of my favourite hobbies – bat surveys! Not perhaps one of the more obvious past-times, but since I joined the Bat Conservation Trust in 2012 I have found these little creatures fascinating. And, of course, there is the age-old link between bats and church buildings.

A recent on-going study of medieval churches in Norfolk wanted to see how many churches had evidence of bats in them, and of the two hundred or so surveyed so far, every single one of them had evidence of bats using the churches in some form. This is probably because older churches provide bats with their ideal habitat. These churches have large open spaces in the main body of the church allowing bats to warm up before heading out to look for food, lots of nooks and crannies for the bats to roost in, and churchyards with plenty of trees where flying insects swarm – a bat's favourite food.

The general assumption is that bats in churches must be a nuisance. For some churches where really big roosts live, there can certainly be issues of noise, smell and droppings, but most congregations of churches where bats are present don't even know they are there. And there is a growing understanding that these amazing little animals might be a blessing for a church community. How? you might ask.

Bats are recognised as good habitat indicators. In other words, where bats are thriving the general environment is going to be quite good. They also deal with the issue of large numbers of flying insects in a churchyard. The smallest species of bat in the UK, the Common Pipistrelle, can eat between 2,000 - 3,000 gnats in a single night. Imagine how many gnats would be swarming around if there were no bats to get rid of them!

There are also quite a few misconceptions about bats. Firstly, bats are not blind. In fact, they can see almost as well as we can. But their great skill comes from their use of echolocation. This is where the bat emits a high frequency pulse of sound from their mouth (or nose, depending on species) which then echoes off objects and potential food. The bat hears these echoes and uses them to create an audio 'map' in their brain. This is how they navigate and hunt for food, and it can be done in complete darkness. There is some evidence that a bat's echolocation is so sensitive that they can

distinguish between different textures, and perhaps even different colours, of objects simply by the sound of the echo coming back to them. So there is very little chance of one getting caught in your hair if you are out at night time – another common misconception!

Different species of bats make different sounds when they echolocate, and we can listen in using a bat detector which makes the sounds audible for humans. This is how I first got interested in bats. I went out with a local bat group on a walk with a bat detector and listened to these remarkable calls as bats swooped about above me. I learned how to identify different species by the distinctive sound and frequencies of their calls.

I am very lucky to be vicar of six medieval church buildings, so I went along to the first Bats in Churches conference last year. The conference brought together experts in heritage, ecology, and church members to talk about how we can work together to protect our beautiful church buildings, keep them in a suitable condition as places of worship, and protect our wonderful range of bat species. A recently awarded grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund means that a research project to help with these issues can continue.

All bat species in the UK are protected by law. As such, we are now seeing a slight improvement from the long decline in bat numbers in our country. With this new research taking place and the growing awareness of these amazing animals, we hope to see a return to much healthier numbers of bats in our churchyards and the wider countryside.

After reaching an agreement with Birmingham Anglers, several volunteers have begun clearing the land adjacent to the wharf with the eventual goal of exposing the ruins of the Mill. The Council is grateful for all the work and dedication of the volunteers.

"WEE" PROJECT UPDATE

YES, progress *is* going on apace! The new roof is fitted courtesy of Allen Fabrications in Evesham who donated really high spec insulated sheets to the Trust. We have had a new gate made for the wider disabled entrance. Our electrician has completed the first fix for the wiring. The unit is now fully insulated and the wall boards are fitted. This month (May) we had the work to date passed by the building inspector.



At last we have a water supply as we were connected by Severn Trent on 16 May, which, in addition to us now being on main drains, allows us to be independent and to develop the facilities in the future. In the area immediately around the toilet block we have completed levelling and landscaping where we brought the drains and water to site and have sown the grass seed just ahead of the recent rain.

The Volunteer project group continue to average three days a week and, contrary to popular belief, there is still a lot of work to do. We have now reached the detail stage and it is important that we take our time to "get it right" to be able to produce a top quality finish to the facility for the future benefit of the community.

CLEEVE PRIOR GARDEN CLUB

Although the inclement weather resulted in us not being able to take full advantage of the lovely settings of Field Barn, it did not affect either the level of attendance or enthusiasm as the meeting attracted a large audience with every seat being taken. We were rewarded with a highly interesting, entertaining, and amusing presentation on the subject of "Perennials from Seed" by Rob Cole.

We learnt that seed sowing should be 3 parts peat based compost/2 parts John Innes/1 part horticultural grit. Seeds sown in small pots should have half an inch of crushed horticultural grit in the bottom of the pot for drainage, aeration, and moisture holding, with another thin layer of grit on top of the pot. We were also told that perennial seeds can be sown outdoors from October to March and left there to germinate, with some protection from slugs, mice etc. Maybe Cleeve Prior club members will be inspired to have a go!

8 July is the date for the Garden Club's trip to Hampton Court Flower Show and tickets have been sent out to everyone who has booked.

As we do not have a meeting in August, the next meeting will be on 6 September in the Memorial Hall when Brian Ellis will be discussing "Roots and Shoots".

Blooming Cleeve

Thanks are due to the three village organisations whose combined efforts have resulted in the beautiful floral display outside the Memorial Hall. The Parish Council has funded the planters and the plants; the Garden Club has undertaken to care for the plants, and the Hall Management has installed an outside tap to provide essential watering facilities.

Cleeve Prior Ramblers

On Saturday in the middle of June nine walkers, dressed for the tropics, met at the car park by the old Avon Bridge south of Pershore. It was to be the hottest day of the year so far but, fortunately, Antony had devised a circular route which included some shade.

We started westward along the river past a dozen or so members of the Birmingham Anglers' Club spaced out at intervals along the bank gazing intently at the slowly moving water. Perhaps they were hypnotising the fish but there seemed to be no evidence of success, the fish sensibly preferring their peaceful deep cool habitat to the excitement of a battle with a fisherman.

After a kilometre or so we left the river, crossed the Defford Road and headed north for another kilometre through the welcome shade of Tiddesley Wood. It is an ancient woodland managed by the Worcestershire Wildlife Trust with the object of maintaining the widest possible variety of native trees, flowers and animals (including all-important insects). The conifer plantations planted by the Forestry Commission, which previously owned the wood, are gradually being replaced by broadleaved trees. The orchards which originally formed part of the board were the source of the Pershore Plum which was bred here in the early part of the 19th century.

Once through the wood, we turned eastward and made our way back down to the river and thence to the car park. We had walked 8.8 km (5.5 miles) and probably each lost 2litres of water because of the heat.

Lunch was at the Angel in Pershore, where Antony had arranged a private dining room. The welcome, service, ambience and food were superb; thoroughly recommended. Our thanks to Antony for his faultless planning.
