The Benefice of the East Vale and Avon Villages

October 2018

One hundred years ago, one of the most destructive conflicts in human history finally came to an end. For perhaps the first time, the true horrors of war were not confined to the battlefield but became part of the national consciousness. Such was the scale of the loss that every community, every village, every street – practically every family – could name someone who was lost, or had close friends who were in mourning. Our very culture changed as a result of what our young men and women experienced, both on the front lines of battle and on the home front, where mud and fear and grief and loss blurred the lines of social distinction. It was in this crucible of destruction that the ideas of a Welfare State and a National Health Service were born.

The Church of England itself began to reassess its own function and identity as a result of chaplains returning from the front line, and many soldiers including Harry Patch – the last survivor from the Third Battle of Ypres (Passchendaele) – talked about how their experiences in the trenches had destroyed their faith in the Church. A change was needed, and the Church began to champion the causes of those left broken and bereft, resulting in reforming Bishops like Archbishop William Temple (Canterbury 1942-44) who pushed for social reform as well as religious renewal.

Today the Church holds a privileged position as one among many organisations that seek to remember those who lost their lives, those who came home broken, those who kept our industries alive at home, and those who waved good-bye to loved ones never to see them return. This month we have numerous events, exhibitions and displays to honour these people, and special services at each church on Remembrance Day itself, 11th November. Please do have a look at the events taking place in your local church, and join with us to remember the fallen.

We will remember them.

Arthur G. Sisam Pvt S/no 16791 South Wales Borderers. Died aged 28.

One hundred years ago on 2 November 1918, Arthur Sisam became the eleventh and last person from Cleeve Prior who sacrificed his life during World War 1 fighting for King and Country. Born in 1890, he was the son of Thomas and Mary Jane Sisam who lived in Cleeve Prior. Arthur enlisted in September 1914 before going out to France in September the following year.



The Evesham Journal just reported his death and gave this brief account of his service : “Going to France in 1915 he has been in all the fighting with his Battalion, never been wounded or sick but twice home on service leave. He left his Battalion on October 25th for fourteen days’ leave, was taken ill on arrival at London and died from pneumonia at the King Georges Military Hospital in London”. This was the start of the Spanish flu pandemic that swept the world from 1918 – 1920 claiming substantially more lives than were lost in the fighting of World War 1.

Arthur Sisam who died just nine days before the cessation of hostilities is buried in the Brookwood Military Cemetery near Camberley Surrey.

Speaker, Julie Ritchie
‘Winter into Spring’

A presentation on Low Maintenance Planting was given on 3 October by Carol Smith, a garden designer. A high level of interest was created as most gardeners are looking for labour saving ideas to assist in establishing and maintaining a beautiful garden.

Carol discussed installing raised beds, and the use of membrane for weed prevention, with a topping of gravel or bark. It was also interesting to hear what a useful part the huge variety of grasses can play with all the variety and movement that they can bring to the borders, in addition to the benefit of easy maintenance. When carrying out new planting a substance called Mycorrhizal Fungi is very beneficial in establishing quicker growth in the first six months, as it helps the plant develop a secondary root system.

On 7 November Julie Ritchie from Hoo House Nursery will be giving a talk on ‘Winter into Spring’ and will be bringing a selection of plants from the Nursery.

The garden club extends a warm welcome to new members and visitors with an interest in any aspect of gardening. Visitors £4 a meeting. Any surplus plants, seedlings, etc will be gratefully received for our plant table.

Cleeve Prior NWR And The African Maternity Link

What an inspirational speaker! You can certainly see why Oli Jeacock won her national award for services to Midwifery. To hear a young professional speak with such passion and commitment to improving the birth outcomes for Mothers and babies in Sierra Leone, through education and training, using a lot of role play, was wonderful. Oli explained how as a small charity they worked with government officials and how they were able to focus on their aims to make a difference by taking it in small steps. Using photographs she showed us the clinic conditions and explained how few midwives there are. The charity offers training to all levels including, in one case, a cleaner on baby resuscitation. Some delivery clinics do not even have a trained midwife. There are three midwifery schools in Sierre Leone but the base level of education and in particular cognitive reasoning and problem solving is low, which is problematic. Her pragmatic attitude and realisation that these small steps do make a difference and that big change is not going to happen was admirable and educational for us. One of our members has a daughter in Malawi working for a similar charity and she was angry at the small difference they were making. However having heard what Oli had to say, she recognised the importance of getting on and doing something worthwhile even if it didn't challenge the political and economic situation. Thank you to all of you who came and donated so generously to the African Maternity Link, which is organised by six full time midwives and completely self-funded. We were able to give Oli a cheque for £206 to go towards their next visit. If anyone would like to know more, do visit their website www.theafricanmaternitylink.co.uk

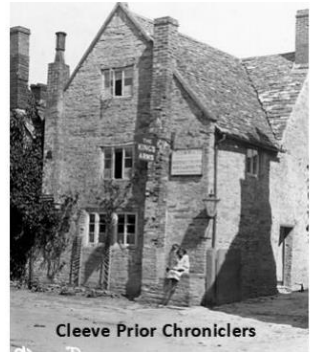
Finally a big thankyou and goodbye to Graham and Sandra George who have been stalwart volunteers at the Trust. We all wish you much happiness in your new home.

#RememberHedgehogs on Bonfire Night.

With bonfire night and Halloween fast approaching, the British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) is urging people to build bonfires on the day they are to be lit to save hedgehogs and other wildlife from appalling suffering.

This will not only save wildlife from burning to death but will also stop the bonfire from getting soaked should it rain the night before! Fay Vass, Chief Executive of BHPS, said "If material is stored on open ground in advance of having a bonfire, it's crucial to dismantle it and move it to another spot just before lighting. Ensure it's moved to clear ground – never on top of a pile of

leaves as there could be a hedgehog underneath, and not too close to pampas grass which can ignite very easily and is another favourite spot for hedgehogs to hide under.”

If a large bonfire must be built in advance, protect it whilst building by putting some chicken wire, at least one-metre-high, all the way around the bottom. This should be held in place with stakes and the wire should slope outwards at an angle to make it difficult to climb, as hedgehogs are good climbers! In case you have missed anything light the fire from one side only and keep people away from the unlit side so that any hedgehogs can hopefully escape in peace.

Cleeve Prior Ramblers’ Big Adventure. On Saturday 20 October seventeen of us together with four dogs gathered on the Green with great excitement because we were going to have a steam train ride to start the ramble.

We drove to Toddington, the home of the Gloucestershire and Warwickshire Steam Railway, and boarded the train which was drawn by a rebuilt Merchant Navy Class express locomotive “P&O”.
