#### The Players Commemorative Event

Congratulations to the Players for their evocative presentation on 10 November commemorating the end of hostilities in November 1918.

This dignified, touching and frequently humorous event took the form of narrations and popular songs for each of the years of the War, starting with the calm before the storm in 1913. It included the militancy of a local suffragette, the work of the women in munitions, and the exhaustion of nurses working during the Battle of the Somme. We were able to enjoy the humour of "they were only playing leapfrog", excerpts from the Wipers Times and a strong tenor voice singing the 1915 Christmas Song from the Trenches.

Songs from the Music Halls popular during the years of War gave a balance to the narrations of the horrors of the warfare of the Trenches. The Memorial Hall management committee organised front of house, and a team of efficient volunteers provided "Rations" during the interval. The talented pianist guided us through a dozen songs, her playing augmented at the end by the trio of young sisters dazzling us with their virtuosity, and the lighting engineer shone the spotlight on the beautifully costumed cast. An innovation for the group was the projection onto the stage of images of scenes from the War, curated by the musical director and organiser.

A collection carried out during the evening raised the impressive sum of £827 which has been donated to Help for Heroes.

A public consultation was launched on 5<sup>th</sup> November on the review of the South Worcestershire Development Plan (SWDP). The purpose is to help the district councils, including Wychavon, decide how best to accommodate housing and employment growth up to 2041.

The current SWDP was approved in 2016 and set out proposals to deliver 28,400 new homes and 300 hectares of employment land by 2030. Government now requires all councils to review their local plans every five years to keep up with changing housing requirements. The latest indications are that South Worcestershire will be required to deliver an additional 14,000 new homes and 169 hectares of employment land by 2041.

The letter to our Parish Council describing the SWDP review has been posted on the Parish Council website if you would like to find out more. You can take part in the consultation online at: <a href="https://www.swdevelopmentplan.org">www.swdevelopmentplan.org</a>. The deadline for responses is 5pm on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> December.

Parking in the village has been raised as issue once again. Most will know that large areas of the village recently had new kerbs installed. This meant that some sections of the blue lias kerbing were regrettably removed. The main reason for the deterioration of the kerbs was due to cars jumping kerbs to park on footways. While the Council understands that some people are anxious not to block traffic, the truth of the matter

is parking on Main St does block traffic and this cannot be avoided. What can be avoided is damage to kerbs and blocking footways. Please be considerate of pedestrians when parking cars.

While on the subject of blocked footways, parishioners are requested to leave rubbish bins close to their property, leaving access for prams and wheelchairs.

Holiday rubbish collection date schedule: Wednesday, 26 December, will be collected on Saturday, 29 December.

There will be defibrillator training in the Memorial Hall on 13 March 2019 at 7pm. Parishioners interested in attending the training should contact the Clerk.

#### **Market Gardening Heritage project**

A new two-year project focussing on the market gardening heritage in the Vale of Evesham has just been awarded £68,700 by the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) and £5,000 from Historic England. The project is being run by Worcestershire Archive & Archaeology Service (WAAS), in partnership with Cleeve Prior Heritage Trust, Vale Landscape Heritage Trust, Worcestershire Farmsteads Project and Cleeve Prior Parish Council.

Market gardening shaped the local landscape and economy around Evesham from the 19<sup>th</sup> to mid-20<sup>th</sup> century, but much of this heritage and knowledge has since been lost. Every market gardener built themselves a shed at the end of their allotment. Locally known as hovels, these since neglected historic buildings will be the focus of the project.

Thanks to National Lottery players, alongside public events and the production of educational materials, a survey will be carried out to record surviving hovels and three will be physically restored. Few records exist about these once-common buildings and it is currently not known how many survive. The Market Gardening Heritage project is seeking volunteers to help carry out the hovels survey during the next two winters, whilst vegetation is low. To sign up, or for further information, please contact Worcestershire Archive & Archaeology Service (explorethepast@worcestershire.gov.uk).

Paul Hudson, Learning and Outreach Manager at WAAS, explained: "We are thrilled to get this money to help us record these structures which were an important but often overlooked part of the landscape in the Vale of Evesham, as well the giving us the opportunity to restore three. We also look forward to hearing people's stories of market gardening and making them available."

Vanessa Harbar, Head of HLF West Midlands, said "We are delighted to support this project, which, thanks to money raised by National Lottery players, will mean that more people will be able to get involved with, protect, and learn about the heritage right on their doorstep."

#### **News from Field Barn**

The Garden project moves on well thanks to the herculean labours of two key volunteers.

We had our first official educational visit by Pebworth primary school, which bodes well for the future. It was wonderful to see them enjoying the November sunshine, discovering the difference between apple and pear trees by looking at the bark and the fruit buds. Peter Howe used the Field Barn complex for his Bird Box making day on Saturday 3 November. Peter is to be commended for his enthusiasm and commitment to bird life. The facilities are great for this type of activity and we welcome enquiries for similar country craft or environmental activities.

#### The Millennium Green - A Bit of Background

The Cleeve Prior Millennium Green Trust (CPMGT) was set up in 1999 to purchase then farm land on Quarry Lane, and establish a new village green as part of the Millennium Celebrations, the idea being that the land would be held in perpetuity for the benefit of parishioners, for recreation and education.

There is grass to be cut frequently, hedges to maintain, gates to be painted and repaired or replaced when vandalised, wood chip to be spread when paths get muddy, the crescent mound and Lime Kiln to be strimmed, cow parsley to eradicate, paths to be kept clear of brambles and briars, and a pond as well.

Since the inauguration the CPMGT have devolved the maintenance of the 'Green' to the Cleeve Prior Heritage Trust, because they have the body of volunteers necessary to do the physical work. Twice a year the Heritage Trust organises a working morning to help with specific tasks in the Autumn and Spring. Unfortunately the clear up on Sunday 4

November elicited a poor response which was very disappointing. Hopefully this is down to a last minute change of date due to poor weather on the original date. However thanks to funding from the Parish Council the pond has been scraped and trees and weeds removed. We rely heavily on the goodwill of our volunteers but it is a limited resource and it is important that those who benefit from the Millennium Green who are able to spare a few hours come and show willing a couple of times a year. So please next time you see a working party request do try to come along and help.

Note to dog owners – there are only a few who don't pick up the poo and make it unpleasant for all and dangerous for small children using the Green. Please don't be lazy; go out with bags and use them!!!
