There are two seats on the Council. Anybody thinking of becoming a member can do so by co-option. Parishioners interested in becoming a member of the Council should contact the Clerk or a Council member.

The Notice of Public rights and Publication of Unaudited Annual Governance & Accountability Return was posted last week. Any parishioner wishing to review the accounts can do so by appointment with the Clerk.

The outline planning application (No. 19/00140/OUT) for up to 80 dwellings to be built on the Travellers' site on Evesham Road was heard on 25th July. The Wychavon Planning Committee meeting was attended by some twenty Cleeve Prior village residents with similar representation by the Travellers.

The planning officer in charge of this outline application had considered the many arguments and concluded that the request for development should be refused primarily on the basis that the site is outside the designated Cleeve Prior development boundary.

The meeting proceeded with representations from various parties followed by debate by the planning committee members. The outcome was that the Planning Committee decided to override the recommendation and voted unanimously to allow the Planning Application to proceed. There is a long process to move from outline permission to commence actual building activity. The Parish Council will be intimately involved in the process.

The streetlights will be a topic of consideration at the September meeting. Anybody wishing to have their views heard is welcome to attend.

Church Questionnaire Feedback.

Thank you to all of you who took the time to complete and return the questionnaire.

We had 42 returns which is double the number of regular attendees at the church and represents about 1 in 6 households. You clearly value the church both as a historical building and a quiet place for contemplation, for formal worship or visiting the resting place of loved ones. Links with the school were less well-known about. The church is important to the village community with 32 returns saying it is very important and 7 quite important. Most of you who responded are aware of the church activities and you are most interested in concerts, wine and cheeses evenings, a harvest supper, flower festivals and more children's events. Some of your specific suggestions were for a Christmas family event, outreach for the elderly and less able and possibly a get together in the pub between the weeks that the tea shop is open. Many of you expressed interest in hearing more about our fundraising plans and thought the newsletter was a good way of communicating.

You will notice that there is some fencing around the church at present, this is because we have had an abseiling inspection of the tower and there is some loose mortar, so please take care when in that area.

We have also had a bat survey done and we have three kinds of bats. We will need to do more observation of the bats so will be looking for volunteers to help with a night watch. Most significantly the work on the church will be delayed as the bats are protected and cannot be disturbed during the breeding season April – October.



CHILDREN'S CHARITY SEEKING MENTORS

Could you spare an hour or two a week? Would you like to help children and young people in the Worcester area?

Local children's charity Mentor Link is recruiting Volunteer Mentors to support children and young people in schools. Owing to a current shortage of mentors, Mentor Link would like to hear from women and men who would like to support children in schools for around an hour each week. Anyone interested should be a good listener, patient and enjoy working with children and young people.

The Mentors are trained to support and encourage young people who are facing issues which are impacting on their education and well-being, with a view to improving their self- esteem and engagement in learning. The charity has an excellent track record of success in achieving positive outcomes with children and young people.

The charity is hoping volunteer mentor Mark Warmington's experience will inspire men in to get involved. Mark joined the charity last year as a Mentor and has supported a number of students during that time. He has commented that:

"Volunteering with Mentor Link gives me an opportunity to make a difference in a young person's life. Each of my mentees know they can speak about anything that is important to them and truly be heard. This helps build their confidence and trust in adults that they won't be judged, that their point of view is important and that they have an outlet to work through the challenges and pressures they are facing in life."

Mentor Link is a Safer Recruiter and requires two 2 character references and an Enhanced DBS clearance. They will provide induction training, travelling expenses, on-going training, and a dedicated team of staff to support you in your role.

2019 Cleeve Prior Memorial Cricket and Rounders games

On Sunday 21 July the village held the 6th annual Memorial Cricket Match between Upper and Lower Cleeve, followed by the inaugural Ladies' Rounders match. This year's fundraising was for the Church roof appeal.

The pitch was in perfect condition, following our two expert groundsmen, John Arkell on his tractor and Derek Wilkinson on the roller. Keith and Glenn made sure the pitch was marked to regulation standard. Mike Walker rang the bells 13 times to mark those young soldiers from our village who lost their lives in the two wars, followed by a minute silence. The two umpires Keith Richards and Paul Stewart took up their positions at the wicket to ensure players were kept in check, and Doug Carr and Judy Winter sat down to concentrate on keeping score. Ian Robinson was on the mic providing commentary, motivation and humour.

Lower Cleeve (captained by Sam Bannister) won the toss and put Upper Cleeve (captained by Iain Macdonald) in to bat first. Both teams had a mix of young and younger players and, miraculously, 11 a side. Competition was intense, and Upper Cleeve put on a steady run rate with some fine batting from the youngsters, of whom two carried their bat after scoring 20 and retiring. Upper Cleeve finished their 20 overs with 118 runs on the board. Spectators meanwhile were enjoying the excellent cricket, great weather, fine food and drink.



Next in were Lower Cleeve who had been set a challenging target to beat. It looked almost out of reach when after two overs they were no runs, and 1 wicket down, soon losing another four wickets putting on just 20 runs. Upper felt this was in the bag. A strong middle order batting performance

from seasoned Lower Cleeve players saw the run rate rise, and they stemmed the losses and started to build a healthy run rate. In the end they passed the total required with a fine four to win the match.

After a short break, the headline event (the Ladies' Rounders) were preparing themselves for combat. Again, a lovely mix of young and younger players took part. But before battle commenced both teams were briefed on the rules (don't think anyone listened, if indeed the umpires knew them!) but after much deliberation a coin was tossed and Upper were put into bat first.

The noise from the teams and spectators could be heard in the Littleton's. Each player had two turns to bat and before no time at all memories of childhood rounders came flooding back, and the competition became fierce. Finally, after the dust and noise settled Upper Cleeve achieved a very healthy score of 6 rounders and looking forward to fielding, which was more than could be said for the umpires, Glenn, David and Paul.



Now it was Lower Cleeve's turn to bat with the challenge being to win the first Ladies' Rounders match, and the largest trophy ever seen (can you spot it in the picture?). Scoring was tight, and some good hits proved the deciding factor, scoring 7 rounders (two of which were for home runs), giving Lower Cleeve this year's victory. The gauntlet has

been thrown down for next year, a big thanks must go to the ladies and girls who made this a fantastic and fun event.

Now – if you're still reading and haven't fallen asleep - I would like to thank some special people who have not already been mentioned. Donna from the Kings Arms, who not only offered to do the catering and BBO, also donated the first prize raffle for a meal for two with a bottle of wine in the pub and, as a very special and heartwarming gesture for this great cause, donated all of the food for the event as well. A BIG thank you. Gina Carr and Lis Hughes who got you to buy raffle tickets, raising over £390; Pat who provided teas and coffees, the ladies and gents who helped run the bar, Ian Robinson for stocking the bar. And a huge thanks to the regular volunteers who turned up Sunday morning to set up the event and take it down. The men and boys who made up the upper and lower cricket teams, and of course the ladies and girls who took part in the Rounders, making the day very entertaining. David Davenport and Glenn Humphreys who helped me organise this year's Memorial Cricket and Rounders day, without them it wouldn't have happened. Finally you, the villagers of Cleeve Prior who came out in force and gave generously supporting this wonderful annual village event to remember those who fought and lost their lives in the two world wars and we thank you for raising a record amount of money for village charities with the majority going to the Church roof fund.

Coming Up – Dates for your diary!

Saturday 21 September 11am - 4.00pm: A '**Drop In Day**' organised by the Market Garden Heritage Group to view the Hovel, artefacts and static displays describing the social history derived from the Market Gardeners. There will be a continuous apple pressing demonstration. Teas and refreshments for sale, tours of the orchards and ponds and historical walks into the heart of the Village.

Early Plum Picking in Earls Lane Orchard – from late July

The pedestrian gate is now unlocked to allow villagers entry to pick the plums. The Purple Pershore, two rows of mature old trees, have a good crop. The younger trees, various cultivars, have not set well due to the cold weather at flowering.

Educational Visits

We are focusing on encouraging schools to use the Trust's land and orchards as Outdoor Classrooms, and are making some headway. Following an initial visit from the Head at Bretforton Village School he returned to bring all his staff and their Forest School Organiser. They were most enthusiastic about Field Barn and the opportunities it presents for outdoor learning. They now have three visits planned, two in October, and one in early summer 2020.

We have to raise a considerable amount of money each year to maintain Field Barn and it is hoped that these visits might make a significant difference. Natural England are currently supporting educational visits through grant aid in order to encourage outdoor learning. So schools can come and visit for free!

We will be trialling our exciting new educational experience, led by our Associate Forest School Professional, Vix Powell, in October and hope that this will be the start of encouraging many more schools to visit.

We have now had three groups of volunteers from the NFU Mutual, achieving remarkable things, in extreme weather conditions. Can you spot what they

have been doing? We offer our grateful thanks to them for all their efforts and especially to our own volunteers who led them.
