

November is usually the time when people start to think about everything that needs to be done for Christmas, and the Church is no different. This is a shame, as November has important events of its own.

First, and perhaps foremost, we have Remembrance Sunday. The commemorations of the 100th anniversary of the end of World War One last year were especially poignant but the work of ensuring we never forget the sacrifice of past generations continues. But before then we have All Saints' Day on 3rd November where the Church commemorates all the people who have sought to build up the church and the Christian faith over the past 2,000 years. This year we end the day with our All Souls' service at Badsey church when we remember those dear to us who have died. This is a very special service when the names of our loved ones are read out and we have the opportunity to light a candle in their memory. Everyone is welcome to come to this service and light a candle, whether it is in memory of someone lost recently or long ago. There is no time limit on remembering a loved one.

Then, at the end of the month, we have the festival of Christ the King, when the Church celebrates that Jesus Christ reigns in heaven. This festival is a symbol of hope, based on the promise in the Bible that all things will eventually find their true meaning in Jesus. So, plenty to keep us busy until Christmas!

the railway that was made famous by the film


The Bridge on the River Kwai

Cleeve Prior Heritage Trust News from Field Barn –November 2019

Coming Up – Dates for your diary! Sunday November at 10 am

We hope, weather permitting. to organise a working group day on the Millennium Green on Sunday 3 November at 10.00am. The brambles and scrub are growing apace in the western wooded area and need cutting back. We bring the tools and drinks and if you can bring gloves and boots we can really make a difference.

We have installed electric heaters and upgraded the lighting in the meetings room and kitchen at Field Barn which will allow for extended usage by the Community.

Education at Field Barn

Bretforton Village School spent two days with us in October. The first visit focussed on healthy eating and apple pressing. The children also explored the orchards and woodland area with their teachers, learning more about the natural environment and trees. A big thank you to all the volunteers who gave their time to help the children with the apple pressing. The children were absolutely thrilled with their experience and took apple juice home to share with their families.

On the second day Bretforton came to trial one of our new Education Programmes, Animal Life, with our associate trainer Vix Powell. After a short introduction to Field Barn, apples and healthy eating, they disappeared off into the orchards and woodland for a range of bug and poo hunting tasks. The newly installed heating and lighting meant that the meeting room became a very welcoming indoor classroom and refectory! Again, a big thank you to all the volunteers whose work preparing for these visits makes them possible. We have received very positive feedback from the school and Gina, Vix and Linda GC are meeting with them for a formal feedback session to see how we can develop our programme. Do have a look on the website to see what is on offer.

Other education days are in the pipeline for 2020.
